

U.S. Unemployment Rate by Race




Energize Colorado Gap Fund

The <u>Energize Colorado Gap Fund</u> will provide more than \$25 million in small business loans and grants to boost small businesses impacted by COVID-19. Sole

Any eligible Colorado small enterprise is welcome to apply. Priority will be given to the following applicants:

- majority-owned by black, indigenous, people of color, veterans, or women
- 10 ruras areas with population of tess than 50,000 people
- · in the tourism sector
- with limited or no access to capital financing or other federal, state or local grants/loans

COVID-19 Health Equity Response Team

Recommendations:

- o Ensure racial and ethnicity COVID-19 data are accessible, transparent and used in decision-making,
- o Determine proactive measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in specific communities,
- o Work with state teams coordinating resources and logistics to help curb health disparities related to COVID-19,
- o Increase access to testing and care services
- o Share time-sensitive information about how Colorado communities are experiencing particular challenges related to the COVID-19 response, and
- o Develop policy recommendations to better assist and prepare communities of color during the current COVID-19 pandemic as well as future state emergencies.




From Theory to Practice

- 3. Have you used a variety of data sources
- 4. How will this proposed goal/objective/strategy benefit traditionally underserved communities?
- 5. Will traditionally underserved communities have power in the decision-making process? What type of decision-making power (refer to <u>IAP2 spectrum</u>)? Have we clearly communicated these expectations with community partners/leaders?
- 6. How are communities that are traditionally left out of decision-making involved in defining success? Are there mechanisms in place for these communities to hold decision makers accountable?
- 7. How are results being evaluated and communicated?

Response and Recovery Efforts

- Bilingual and Bicultural staff on our case contact and monitoring and Outbreaks teams
- Following up with Mobile Home Parks/Apartment Complex Property Managers to ensure properties are safe.
- Developed a case contact and monitoring video in english and spanish
- Working with our partners who work with the Latinx community to develop messaging and outreach
- Hiring a Latinx Outreach Specialist
- In recovery, we will be utilizing our strong partnerships through our Community Health Improvement Plan to re-assess needs and strategies to meet those needs in our community.





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

What did we accomplish?

- Well over an estimated 5000 views on all videos
- 300+ personal contacts/phone calls
- 60 home visits
- Roughly 400 cloth masks and 1000 disposables masks handed out
- Roughly over 300 pairs of gloves handed out
- 9 thermometers handed out
- Partnership with community agencies to provide food boxes.
- Hand sanitizer bottles were purchased/donated which and distributed to families.
